## Sunday 27<sup>th</sup> December – First Sunday of Christmas

After the beautiful but different 'Festival of Nine Lessons' last Sunday, I reflected on the many other changes that have been necessary to the routines of our lives during 2020.

The world-wide effects of Covid-19 have impacted our lives and it has been necessary to change old routines in order to 'live through' this current pandemic. At times it has felt as if as soon as we settle into a routine, the situation changes - the sand literally shifts underneath us, and new behaviours are required of us for our own and our 'neighbour's' protection.

The 'Nine Lessons' service was without the much-loved Carols (which for me set the mood for Christmas) is one such 'necessary change'. At different times during the year, we have accepted frequent washing of hands, carrying around sanitizer gels, wearing face masks in public including at places of Worship, social distancing, forming 'bubbles', no visiting friends indoors, to name but a few.

Through the birth of Christ, we have hope of a 'different' future. In the words of a favourite Hymn Christ is the solid rock - for with Him we experience no changes, no shifts, but constant love, forgiveness and support.
